Who was George Smith Patton III?

George Smith Patton III (November 11, 1885 - December 21, 1945) was a general in the United States Army who commanded the Seventh Army in the Mediterranean Theater of World War II, then the Third Army in France and Germany after the Allied invasion of Normandy in June 1944.

Who was General Patton?

General Patton led the division during the Tennessee Maneuvers in June 1941, and was lauded for his leadership, executing 48 hours' worth of planned objectives in only nine. During the September Louisiana Maneuvers, his division was part of the losing Red Army in Phase I, but in Phase II was assigned to the Blue Army.

Who was Patton & what did he do?

What is a battery made of?

Realizing that a battery was basically zinc plates immersed in acid, the developers came up with a battery made of a glass ampule filled with acid surrounded by small metal plates. When the shell was fired, the glass broke and the acid covered the plates.

What did George Patton say about the VT fuze?

It was "devastating," said George Patton. "It" was the variable time (VT)/proximity fuze that turned near-misses into kills. Late in 1944, as General George Patton's Third Army was moving toward Germany, he wrote a letter to the War Department describing the success his troops had experienced with a new artillery shell and fuze:
